
What is HOBO?

Martin, Neely Henry, and Weiss will
have it. What is it? It is a nonprofit association of Home Owners
and Boat Owners on Lake Mitchell.
Why is it important? Most
importantly, it is to have an
organization ready so that we can all
pull together and with our great
number of members, preserve,
protect and improve our lake and
eventually the entire Coosa River.

For example, our Georgia neighbors have been trying for a number of years to divert large amounts of water from this river. We cannot let this happen!

What will Lake Mitchell HOBO do? Your HOBO organization is already hard at work locating and contacting every homeowner on the lake. We have

opened a bank account and applied for non-profit status. There are already a few people on the lake who are doing regular water tests. A "Fish Tissue Report" and a "Reservoir Monitoring Report" have been ordered from ADEM. In the future, we plan regular tests of the water in every major tributary feeding the lake as



well as the main channel. Our concerns are:

- restocking fish
- protecting edible fish
- insuring water safety
- establishing good communication
- controlling litter
- securing garbage pick-up
- forming neighborhood watches
- working to lower insurance rates
- improving roads

At the same time we want to become a big lake "family" by getting to know one another. We plan to organize, sponsor, and help fund fun activities such as 4th of July Fireworks, water parades

and picnics. We are sure you will have many other suggestions which we hope you will share with us. Return the attached membership application and registration fees. Fees are \$25 for home owners or \$10 for others for

Special Feature: "Is Your Lake Dying?"

No lake is immune! Whether it's your carelessness or the ignorance of others, our lakes are constantly under siege. We can ill afford poor water, much less poor publicity.

Many Lake Scientists believe that forming a lake association is the single most important action individuals can take to protect their lake. Previously ignored property owners and lake users carry a lot more clout when they get organized. Local, county and state officials snap to attention when a strong lake association comes courting. Lake associations are often eligible for federal and state grants to conduct lake surveys, weed control and various scientific studies. Thirty-one hints for saving our lakes follow.

- 1. Remove all weed fragments from your boat trailer and propeller before leaving a lake.
- 2. Don't throw weed fragments back into the lake. Place them in the trash at the launch site.
- Post a notice at the launch site to remind boaters to remove weed fragments from their boats.
- **4.** If your lake has a weed harvester, make sure it's being used properly.
- Watch for any new or unusual species of plant growth, especially near the boat ramp. If an unusual plant is spotted, contact your state department of environmental protection.
- 6. Check the sludge level in your septic tank every year. Pump it when the sludge fills half the tank. The average for pumping is 2-3 years for full time residents, and 5-6 years for seasonal residents.

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- Organize a neighborhood septic tank "pump out" and take advantage of group discount rates.
- **8.** Check the labels on detergents and use non-phosphate brands. Phosphate rich sewage leaking into the lake feeds the weeds.
- **9.** Avoid pouring bleach, paint, grease and chemicals down the drain.
- **10.** Ground-up garbage from disposals can overburden a septic system.
- 11. Perform a dye test to determine if your septic system is pouring directly into your lake. Dye tablets can be purchased from a hardware or plumbing supply store. Simply put the tablet into the toilet and flush. If dye appears in the lake you've got a problem. Check the ground around the tank for a few weeks for dye as well.
- 12. Your lake association may wish to hire a limnologist (lake scientist) to conduct an environmental survey. The cost may be a few thousand dollars, but the expense may be well worth it.
- **13.** Ask the local health department how to monitor bacteria levels in the lake.
- **14.** Avoid planting lawns and gardens within 50-100 feet of shore.
- **15.** Avoid fertilizing your lawn near the lakefront. If it's absolutely necessary, do so sparingly and not when rain is expected.
- **16.** Consider using natural compost rather than commercial fertilizer.
- 17. Don't wash your boat or car within 100 feet of the lake. Choose non-phosphate detergents and make sure rinse water doesn't run into the lake.
- **18.** When pouring gas from a container into your tank, use a wide mouth funnel to help prevent spills.
- **19.** Some dock and shore side fuel tanks like the Gas Dock are great. They have an automatic shut-off valve to reduce spillage.
- 20. Keep fuel tanks off the dock and away from shore to prevent accidental spills into the lake
- **21.** Check the gas cap on the boat for tightness before every ride.

- **22.** Check your bilge water often for oil or other foul bilge brew. If there is a problem, don't pump it into the lake.
- 23. Leave the shoreline around the lake as natural as possible. Don't cut down healthy trees near the water's edge.
- **24.** Remember that artificial beach usually washes away and can further damage the lake.
- 25. Keep your boat at idle or no wake speed when operating within 150 feet of the shore to help prevent shore erosion and the damage of boats moored near the shore.
- **26.** Reduce power turning which churns up the roughest water.
- 27. Keep a trash bag in your boat.
- **28.** Pick up stray trash around the shore or it will eventually wind up in the water.
- 29. Stay clear of the nesting sites of birds and other animals. Don't harass water fowl.
- **30.** Avoid operating your boat in shallow water. Props churn up bottom vegetation and stir up sediment.
- **31.** Get to know your state and local officials and who the lake experts are.
